FROM THE RECTOR

Six years ago, my friend, Gary, and I made plans to go to New Mexico and ride our motorcycles. Gary's son had major surgery that year, so our trip was postponed. We tried again to go in 2020, but that didn't happen because of the pandemic. This year we finally made the trip.

We rode through six states averaging nearly 300 miles a day, avoiding interstates and staying somewhere different each night. It was the trip of a lifetime! When asked what was the favorite part of my trip I was at a loss for an answer. The Guadalupe Mountains were gorgeous and Carlsbad Cavern was amazing. The colors and rock formations in the New Mexico desert were awe-inspiring and the views in the Rocky Mountains were as well.

Reflecting on the trip I finally know my answer: the ride! The time on my bike gave me ample opportunity to pray and reflect as I rode through God's creation. Time for quiet reflection is difficult for most of us to find. Even in the midst of a pandemic and social isolation, many of us have managed to fill our days and evenings with projects and activities that kept our minds busy with thoughts of what we have done and what we have left undone.

My trip reminded me that listening to others and to God is a spiritual practice. One of the greatest challenges of listening is worrying. It fills our minds with clutter and given the hours upon hours I rode; I was able to let go of my concerns about the church and my family and listen.

I didn't come back with any earth-shattering revelations, but I did find peace. My experience

reminded me of the Lord appearing to Elijah on Mount Horeb. Elijah has fled and is hiding in a cave from Queen Jezebel who wanted to have him killed. Then, in 1 Kings 19:11-13 we read:

Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; 12 and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. 13 When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him . . .

Elijah finds the Lord in sheer silence. Finding God in the silence was what happened to me on my ride. It took me more miles than I like to admit before I ran out of things to worry about – but when I did, when my mind was silent, I felt God's presence. God sends Elijah back into the world, he has more to do – and so do we. The pandemic has challenged us as a church. Many of us have been living in fear, like Elijah we have been hiding.

God is with us; God has not deserted us. Now, I believe, God is calling us to look to the future and reconnect with one another. What is God calling us to do? We need to focus on mission, on what we were doing before the pandemic. We need to find new ways to serve others. It is time to come out of our cave and "go in peace to love and serve the Lord."

After moving to Batesville, she substituted and also worked at Randall's Two and Heritage House gift shops. ST. PAUL'S HISTORY

THE KEALER FAMILY OF ST. PAUL'S

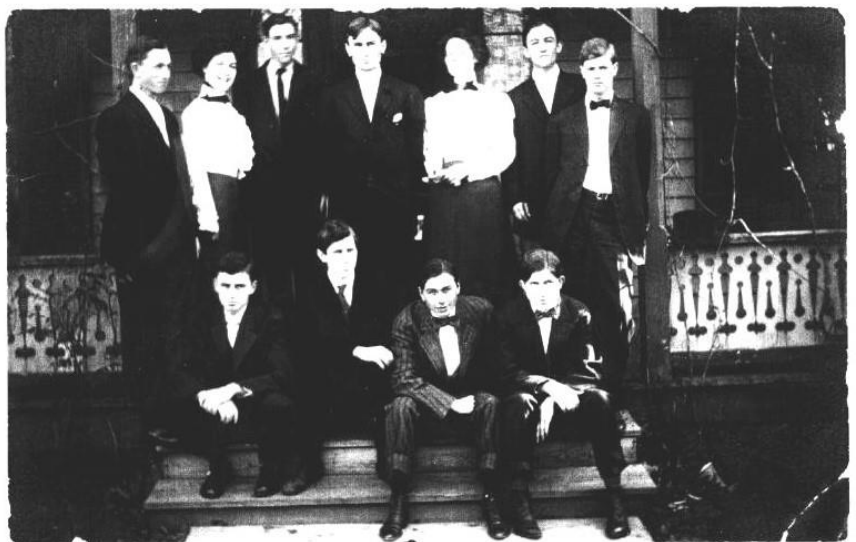
The family of George H. Kealer has played a large part in the history of St. Paul's Episcopal Church. Mr. George Kealer, a native of New York, moved his wife and three children here from Little Rock in the year 1888. He opened a machine shop and eventually became part-owner of the Batesville Iron Works. The family also, for a time, operated a boarding house in the former E. M. Dickinson home on the corner of 7th and Boswell Streets. Later, son Fred Kealer and his wife lived on Sidney Street and he had a very successful career with the U. S. Corps of Engineers.

In 1893, George Kealer's wife, Anna Mae, and daughter, Cora, were baptized by the Rev. Keeble. Anna Mae and Cora were confirmed as members of the church in 1896. Followed by confirmation of son, Fred Preston, in 1900, son, Charles Ernest, in 1904, and finally George H. Kealer was baptized in 1905 and confirmed the following year.

After Mr. Kealer's death in 1915, his widow, Anna Mae, moved to California. Daughter Cora and son Charles Ernest also married and moved away. Children of son, Fred, who remained communicants of St. Paul's for more than 100 years after the family's arrival are Anna Mae Kealer McSpadden, Rose Kealer Dozier, and George B. Kealer. Anna Mae McSpadden survived until June of this year, 2021. Louis Kealer, Sr., who was active after his return to Batesville passed away a month later in July of 2021.

The contributions of the Kealer family to St. Paul's are many and varied. They have held numerous offices, and the baptism, confirmation, marriage and death records are countless in the history of the church. The silver breadbox which was placed in the church was dedicated in memory of Fred and Annie Kealer. Descendants of the family who are still active in St. Paul's are Jacqui and Scott McSpadden, Allen McSpadden, Julie and Tim Dozier, and Danny and Kathy Dozier.

After the death of Louis Kealer, Sr., Father Jim McDonald found a spot in the cement that was poured on the side of the rectory where Louis had placed his name, making him forever remembered. If you get a chance, go look at the sidewalk- The Kealer family history is engrained here at St. Paul's Episcopal.
